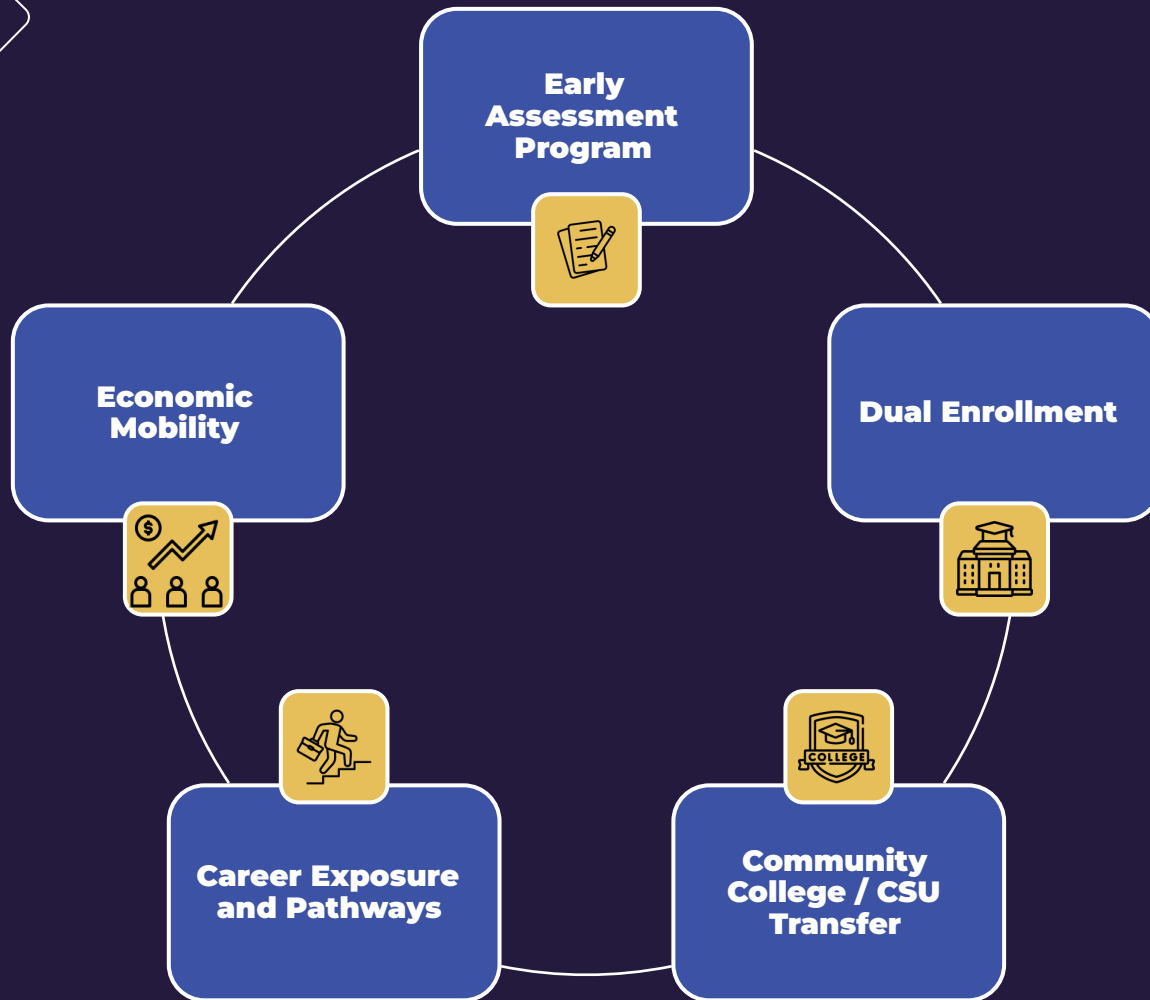

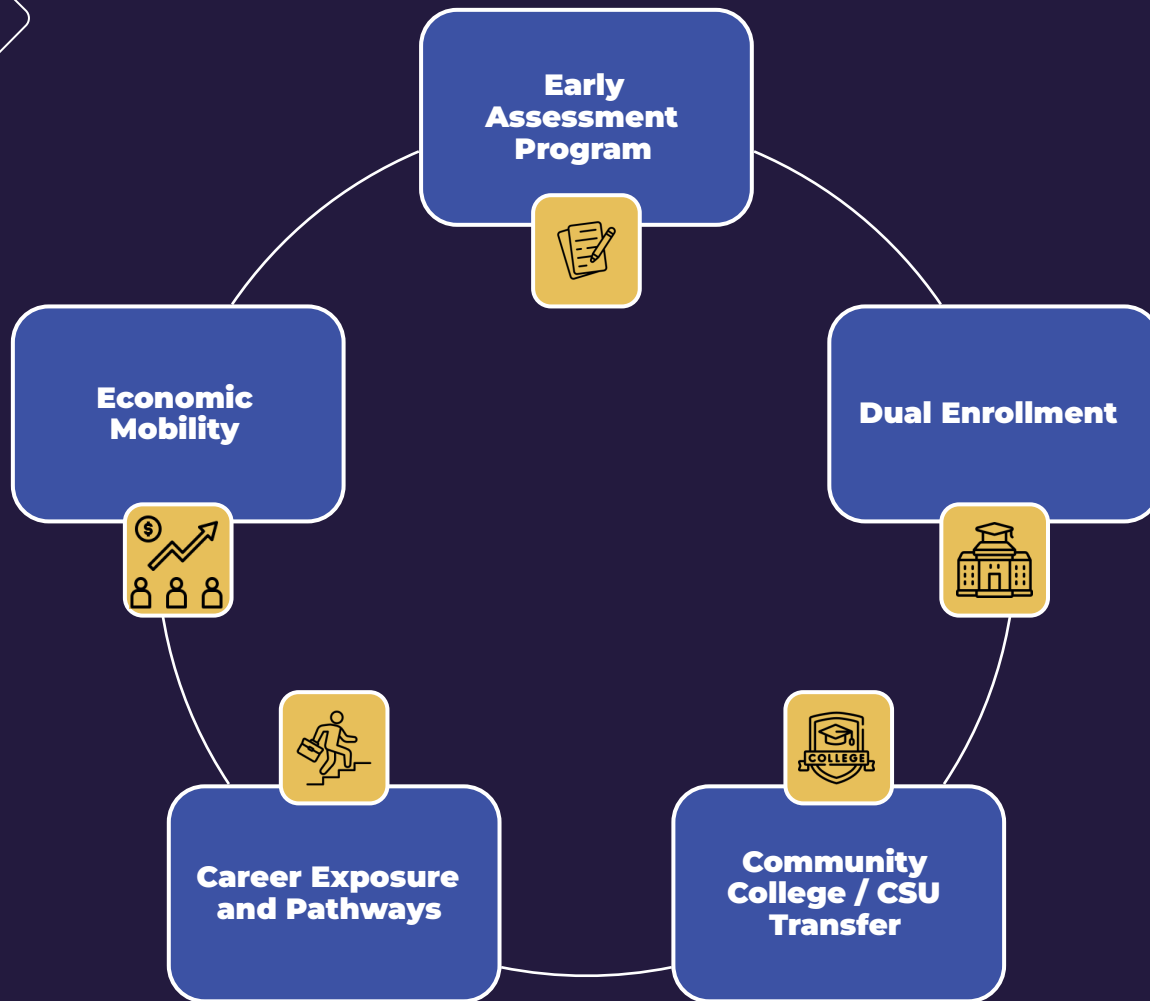

Why Early Pathways Matter

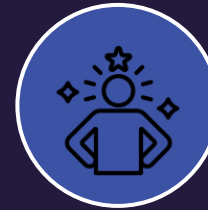


- 82% of CCAP students enroll in college within 1 year of high school vs. 66% statewide
- Former CCAP students complete transfer-level English (59% vs. 42%) and Math (38% vs. 23%) at significantly higher rates
- Dual enrollment leads to higher high school graduation, college entry, and degree completion rates
- 92% of community college applicants to CSU are admitted to at least one campus
