Theatre and New Dance

On Thursday, November 21, the **Theatre** department in collaboration with **EML** and **History**, hosted a pre-show conversation ahead of the performance of *We Are Pussy Riot or Everything Is PR*. The <u>panel discussion</u>, titled "Pussy Riot: What Led a Russian Punk Band to Punk Putin," explored the play through the lenses of Russian history and applied linguistics. Panelists included Emeritus Professor **Elise K. Wirtschafter** (History) and Assistant Professor **Valerie Sky** (English and Modern Languages), moderated by Professor **Bernardo Solano** (Theatre), the play's director. History

Assistant Professor of History Fang Yu Hu's book, *Good Wife, Wise Mother: Educating Han Taiwanese Girls Under Japanese Rule,* received praise in a recent *Taipei Times* review for its groundbreaking focus on how gender-specific values and practical knowledge were taught to Taiwanese girls during World War II. Unlike most studies centered on male subjects, Hu's work sheds light on the Japanese colonial government's assimilation (doka) and imperial subjectification (kominka) policies through the lens of female education. The review commends the book as "overdue" and highlights the value of its analysis.

Philosophy

The **Philosophy department** hosted <u>World Philosophy Day</u> on November 19th. The event was a special day of panels, giveaways, food and critical reflection on the fundamental nature of reality. Students, faculty, and guests came together for thought-provoking discussions, interactive activities, and a deep dive into the big questions that shape our world.

The Digital Humanities Consortium is delighted to welcome three new Faculty Fellows for 2024-2025: Lauren Furey (COM) produces the Pink State podcast, whose Season 3 will showcase the 2024 election; Robert Lewis (HST) will use GIS in his research on World War II and transit mapping through the National Archives; Denisse Vasquez-Guevara (COM) works on public science education, creating short-form videos on science literacy. Dr. Annie Danis' Youth Ambassador Program was recently highlighted in an article by <u>History Colorado</u>. This year, young descendants of Amache incarcerees will participate in the Spiritual Healing Run through the newly launched "Youth Ambassador Experience," a program led by Dr. Danis, Assistant Professor of Anthropology. Dr. Danis also oversees field programs for the University of Denver Amache Project. The program received additional recognition through the Chancellor's Office in their CSU Roundup.

At the <u>Environmental Health Summit</u>, Associate Professor of Geography and Anthropology **James J.A. Blair** discussed Community Benefits Agreements (CBAs), contracts between companies and the communities they impact. Blair explained that CBAs, sometimes enforced by government entities, often address financial and infrastructure mitigation while including workforce provisions such as local hiring and living wages.

Music

Music student-led punk band, Zombieloaf, was featured in a <u>Poly Post article</u>. What started as an eighth-grade passion project, has transformed into something much larger. Earlier this year, the band played for a sold-out crowd at Bronco Fusion, celebrated its 10th anniversary, and now is preparing to release their debut album, Pelican Bay.
