Dr. Mary Kunmi Yu Danico was honored at the Provost's Award for Excellence Symposium on October 3rd. The Provost's Award for Excellence recognizes Cal Poly Pomona faculty who have stood out in their selective field, such as teaching, scholarly and creative activities, and service. Dr. Danico was the Director of the Michi and Walter Weglyn Endowed Chair, and Asian American Transnational Research Initiative at Cal Poly Pomona. Theatre Adjunct Professor **Colin Campbell** <u>writes</u> about the pain of losing his children to a drunk driver, the "permissive culture around dangerous driving," and the passage of <u>Senate Bill 961</u>, which would make passive "intelligent speed assistance" a <u>requirement</u> on all new cars sold in-state by 2030. "We'd be the first state to do it, if [Gov. Gavin] Newsom signs the bill," he says.

The **Theatre department** recently hosted a virtual alumni panel, featuring successful graduates who shared their career journeys and insights into the industry. Panelists **Dustin Schofield** ('07), **Kedra Dawkins** ('11), **Catherine Campbell** ('15), and **Olivia Jones** ('16) discussed their experiences and answered student questions in a lively Q&A session. Directed by Colin Campbell, the play follows the residents of Charlesville, New Jersey, while they plan their last moments on Earth with only eight minutes left to live. Assistant Professor of Latin American literature & creative writing, **Claudia Salazar Jimenez**, was invited to the <u>International Book Fair</u> in New York City. She participated on a panel about Critical Thinking and Migration. Professor Salazar Jimenez was also invited to the <u>LGBTQ+Ñ Festival</u>, the first literary festival that brings together Spanish and Latin American writers who explore and celebrate sexual diversity in their works. This pioneering initiative seeks to provide a platform for creative expression and dialogue about the LGBTQ+ community in the world of literature, as well as to analyze the various creative and social realities in Spanish-speaking countries. Additionally, she was <u>interviewed by the Spanish</u> <u>newspaper El Pais</u> about her new book and her experiences as a Peruvian immigrant in the US.

While in residence as a fully funded <u>Visiting Researcher</u> at the University of Bristol, Professor **Dewey W. Hall** delivered his paper "The Political Ecology of Matter: Marbles, Volcanoes, and Humans" in the Peel Lecture Theatre to the College of Humanities and College of Geographical Sciences on September 18, 2024, which was extremely well received by the Bristol academic community. Hall also traveled to the University of Oxford to deliver his paper "A Materialist Approach to the Parthenon Sculptures: Subject, Object, and Thing" at the New Oxford Research in the Humanities Interdisciplinary Conference on September 27, 2024.

Political Science

Political Science Professor **Renford Reese** recently published his latest book, <u>Violence in America: From a</u> <u>'Criminal's' Perspective</u>. Dr. Reese is the founder and director of the Prison Education Project and the Reintegration Academy, as well as the co-founding executive director of the California State University Project Rebound Consortium. With a rich background in criminal justice, he has produced eight documentaries on the subject. *Violence in America: From a 'Criminal's' Perspective* marks his 12th published book.

Political science adjunct professor, **Farrah Hassen**'s latest <u>op-ed was published by the Colorado Times</u> <u>Recorder.</u> Hassen writes that the costs of war "always reverberate at home" and that Israel's assaults on Lebanon, Syria and Yemen threaten to drag the United States into a wider war with Iran that shouldn't be seen as inevitability.

Do political candidates benefit from celebrity endorsements? An article from <u>The Philadelphia Inquirer</u> cites research by **Mia Santillan** ('21, political science) published in the "<u>The Undergraduate Journal of</u> <u>Political Science</u>" at Cal Poly Pomona. Santillan <u>argues</u> that such endorsements can negatively affect political candidates in the long run.

Economics

The **Economics Department** lost a dear former colleague, Professor **Nestor Ruiz**, on September 3, 2024. Nestor joined the Economics Department at Cal Poly Pomona in 1990 and retired in 2013, serving as Department Chair in 2008 and 2009. Nestor's door was always open for students, and he is fondly remembered as a sincere, dedicated advisor and advocate for our students.

The **California Center for Ethics and Policy** hosted a 2024 Election Fair in the Bronco Student Center on October 11th. Students connected with representatives from political campaigns and heard from groups on both sides of measures on this year's ballot. Jackie Wu, former Orange County election official and author of "on the Front Lines: An Election Official's Story of Protecting the Vote in 2020" also led a discussion.
