History

Eileen Wallis, history professor, was featured in an <u>interview with the LAist</u>, in which she provides historical background on the significance of Rockhaven Sanitarium. "It was really sort of compelling both in terms of just being very different and distinct from what the vast majority of mental health care looked like in the early 20th Century," says Wallis, "But also being quite deliberately and self-consciously gendered." The news clip was promoted by the Chancellor Office's CSU media roundup.

CPP Professor Dr. Fang Yu Hu has published her first book titled <u>Good Wife, Wise Mother</u>. The book traces Japan's efforts to modernize Taiwan through gendered educational practices.

Communication

Dr. Andrea Smith, assistant professor of Communication, and **Anika Ausness-Ayres**, a recent graduate of the Department of Communication, co-authored an article titled "My video, my choice: A quantitative content analysis of U.S. OBGYN TikTok videos in the Post-Roe Era" published in Women's Reproductive Health.

Sunny Lie, Associate Professor of Communication, recently published new peer-reviewed research titled, 'Marriage is like Gambling': Interpreting and Narrating Stories of Hakka Chinese Indonesians' Marriage Migration. This article examines the stories of marriages between ethnic Hakka Chinese women from Singkawang, Indonesia and men in Taiwan. The study deepens and enriches our understanding of the complexities and enduring impacts of marriage migration as experienced across time in Asia.

Communication professors **Nell Horowitz** and **Lauren Furey**, along with former communications student **Hailey Peterson**, recently published an article titled "<u>Exploring the Media Discourse of Neurodiversity</u> and Neurodivergent Individuals: A Step Toward Discovering Possibilities for All People" on Taylor & Francis Online.

Sociology

Dr. Anthony C. Ocampo was featured in an article interview with The Guardian. <u>'A very old political trope': the racist US history behind Trump's Haitian pet eater claim</u> talks about his opinion on recent political news. In the article he said, "The way white Americans have positioned themselves as culturally and morally superior, this is low-hanging fruit to rally xenophobia in a very quick way." Dr. Ocampo's CPP Expert profile features more of his publications and interviews.

Theatre and New Dance

Theatre production, <u>8 minutes Left</u>, debuts October 11 and runs until October 20. The world is coming to an end at exactly 4:44PM today, and no one has had any time to prepare. 8 Minutes Left follows the residents of Charlesville, NJ as they navigate their final moments on this Earth. From a couple with a bunker in their backyard who can't quite figure out how to get in, to two elderly frenemies who fight over their favorite park bench, to a mother observing her children on a playground as she wonders what their lives would have become, this thoughtful and keenly observed play manages to find the intimate humor of humans in crisis. English and Modern Languages

Assistant Professor of Latin American literature & creative writing, **Claudia Salazar Jimenez**, was featured in a recent article in the Mexican newspaper <u>El Sol de México</u>, about Contemporary Latin American women writers, "Claudia Salazar Jiménez, author of the novel "Blood of the Dawn," with which she sought to describe the way in which women entered armed conflicts as part of the guerrilla in Peru at the end of the 20th century. This is considered by the BBC as one of the 10 recommended works." Professor Salazar Jimenez also recently launched her new book, "<u>Migrar y otras artes. Escritos fuera de lugar"</u> at the International Book Fair in Lima, Peru. Published by Editorial Caja Negra, it is a hybrid book related to her own experiences as a Peruvian immigrant in the US.

Spanish professor Amàlia Llombart-Huesca published "Spelling in Spanish Heritage Language Education," Georgetown University Press. The book argues that spelling is not simply the cherry on top of good writing or a mere editing issue; rather, the skills behind the acquisition of spelling lie beneath deeper literacy development. Amàlia Llombart-Huesca discusses how to address this critical skill, including the cognitive skills underlying spelling, the role of age and bilingualism, and a thorough description of the most common types of spelling errors students make and their causes.

English and Nonviolence Studies Professor Emeritus **Andrew Moss** writes that for many reasons including "the fragmented nature of our healthcare system, the medically harmful discontinuities of care and the unacceptable number of uninsured individuals — our nation deserves a genuine 'Medicare for All,' a single-payer healthcare system that's publicly financed, and that provides individuals with comprehensive care and choice in selecting providers."

Political Science

Political science adjunct professor, **Farrah Hassen**'s latest <u>op-ed was published by The Pacific Sun</u> (Marin County-based alt weekly) and was promoted by the Chancellor's Office in the CSU media roundup. Hassen writes hedge funds and private equity firms have driven up housing costs since gaining control over a greater share of the market. This financialization of housing treats basic necessity and fundamental human right as just another commodity.

A new poll conducted by researchers at Cal Poly Pomona, CSU Long Beach and USC suggests that Democrats are slightly ahead of Republicans in six closely watched swing districts. Political Science Assistant Professor **Jarred Cuellar** is part of the California Elections and Policy Poll team that conducted

the survey between Sept. 14-21. Cuellar's poll research has been featured in <u>Politico</u> and on <u>Spectrum</u> News.

Political Science Professor **Renford Reese** has recently published his latest book, <u>Violence in America:</u> <u>From a 'Criminal's' Perspective</u>. Dr. Reese is the founder and director of the Prison Education Project and the Reintegration Academy, as well as the co-founding executive director of the California State University Project Rebound Consortium. With a rich background in criminal justice, he has produced eight documentaries on the subject. *Violence in America: From a 'Criminal's' Perspective* marks his 12th published book.

Political Science professor and Weglyn Endowed Chair, **Neilan Chaturvedi** was <u>featured in USA Today</u> discussing the process of how to change your voter registration after moving. "Registering to vote has never been easier, twenty-four states now offer some form of automatic registration in which eligible voters are automatically registered to vote when they interact with state government agencies like the Department of Motor Vehicles."

Councilmember-Elect Rick Cole has selected **Megheti DerBoghossian** ('24, political science) as a <u>liaison</u> <u>between District 2 residents and City Hall</u>, citing her skills and background as assets for community engagement. DerBoghossian is a seasoned political campaigner, with a background in campaign management and field organization for more than 20 Los Angeles-area political campaigns.

Assistant Professor of Political Science, **Mary Anne Mendoza**, recently <u>published a chapter</u> in <u>State</u> <u>Institutions</u>, <u>Civic Associations</u>, <u>and Identity Demands</u> edited by Amy H. Liu & Joel Sawat Selway published by the University of Michigan Press.

Geography and Anthropology

Professor of Geography, **Kristen Conway-Gomez**, recently published a <u>Conference of Latin American Geography (CLAG) newsletter</u> for which she is serving a second term as Executive Director. The newsletter features the CPP Drone Camp from April 2024 on p26.

James Blair, associate professor of geography and anthropology, was <u>quoted in the LA Times</u> in a story on energy and water use of data centers. "Data centers drain massive volumes of energy and water for chillers and cooling towers to prevent servers from overheating," Blair said, "While the company can tell customers its data center is supported by environmentally friendly solar and geothermal power, it will take that renewable energy away from the rest of California's grid, making it harder for the state to meet its climate goals."

Psychology

Professor of Psychology **Jill Nemiro**, recently released the second edition (2025) of her book, <u>Creativity in Virtual Teams</u>: <u>Key Components for Success</u>, published by Cognella. Now available in e-book and in print.

Music

Assistant Professor of Music, **Nita Baxani**, was <u>interviewed for LA Opera's Behind the Curtain</u>. In this episode, Dr. Nita Baxani, shares her research on BambinO, an opera for babies - and why early music exposure is so important for childhood development.
