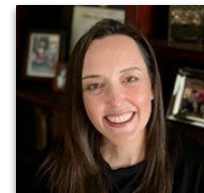

Our Role in the Cradle-to-Career Data System

CaliforniaColleges.edu is a crucial component of the C2C Data System.

AB 132 outlines specific steps in order to implement the Cradle-to-Career (C2C) Data System and realize its objectives, which include:

- ▶ Making CaliforniaColleges.edu tools and services **free to all California school districts serving 6-12th grade students**, with a goal of full participation by June 30, 2026.
- ▶ Designating CaliforniaColleges.edu as the **preferred starting point for all applications to California public colleges (CCC, CSU, UC), FAFSA, and CADAA.**

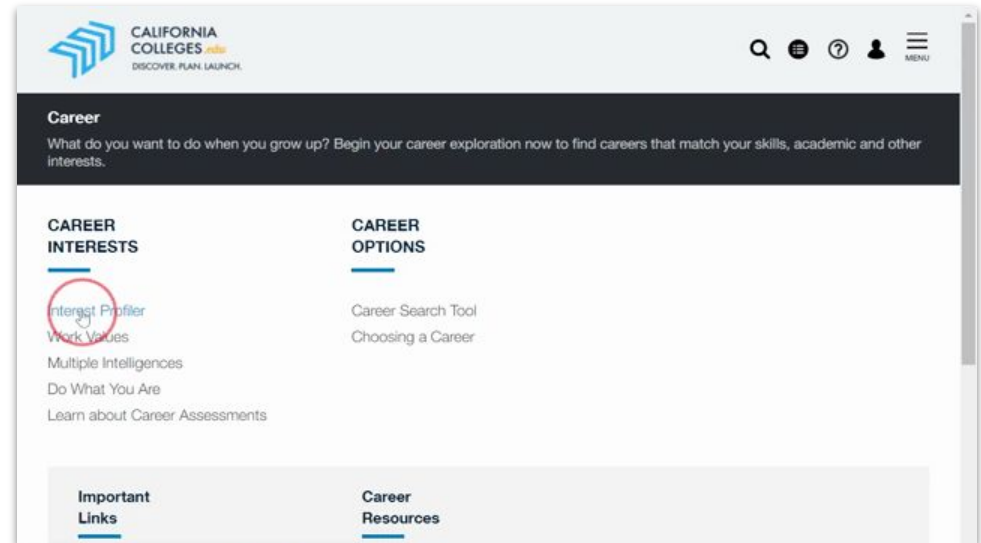


Career Assessments

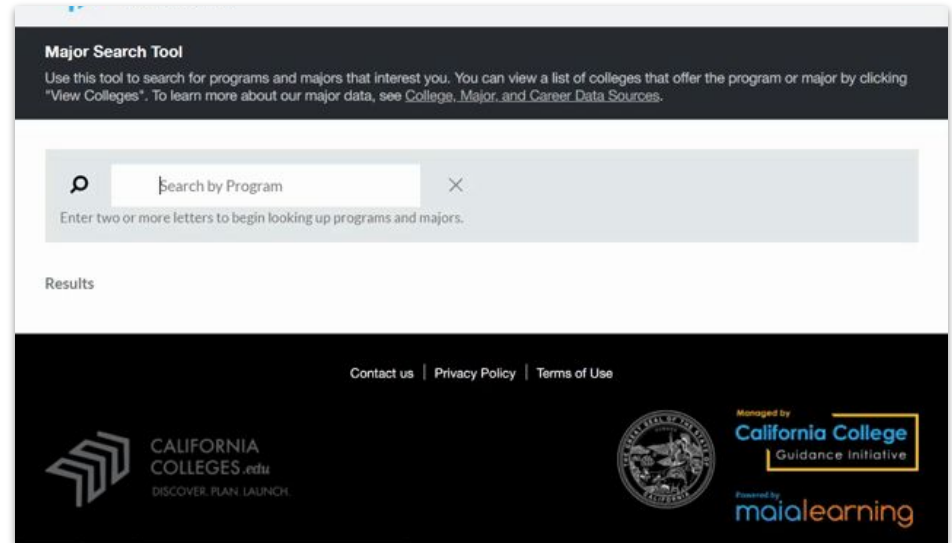


College and Major Search Tools

Our **College Search Tool** helps students find the best colleges in California and across the country, based on the factors that matter most to them.

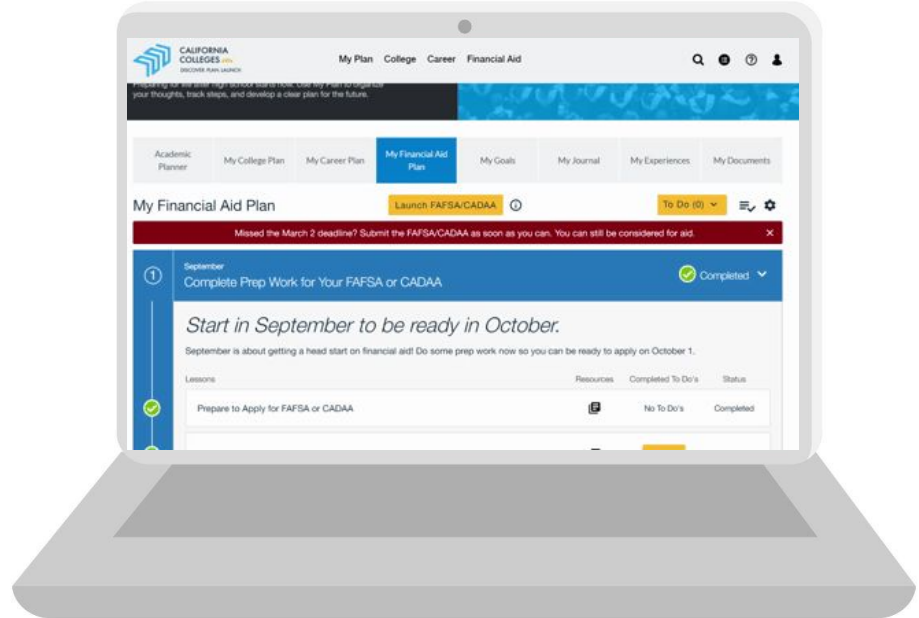




Financial Aid Tools

In Grade 12, the lessons help students prepare for FAFSA/CADAA, **launch their FAFSA or CADAA application**, and walks them through the steps to secure aid.





CSU and UC Eligibility Tools for Students

Students in Partner Districts can use CSU and UC Eligibility Tools to continuously progress monitor their GPA and “a-g” eligibility.

Partnership With CCGI

Partner Districts have a formal data-sharing agreement (MOU) with CCGI in order to bring their high school transcript data to CaliforniaColleges.edu.

Unique features for Partner Districts include:

- ▶ **“a-g” Alignment Support** for districts to ensure that students get correct “a-g” credit for high school courses and grades in their college applications.
- ▶ **CSU and UC Eligibility Tools** that allow students to see their progress towards meeting the minimum requirements for admission to a CSU and UC.
- ▶ The ability to **import verified transcript data** to their Cal State Apply application and UC Application (beginning Fall 2024).

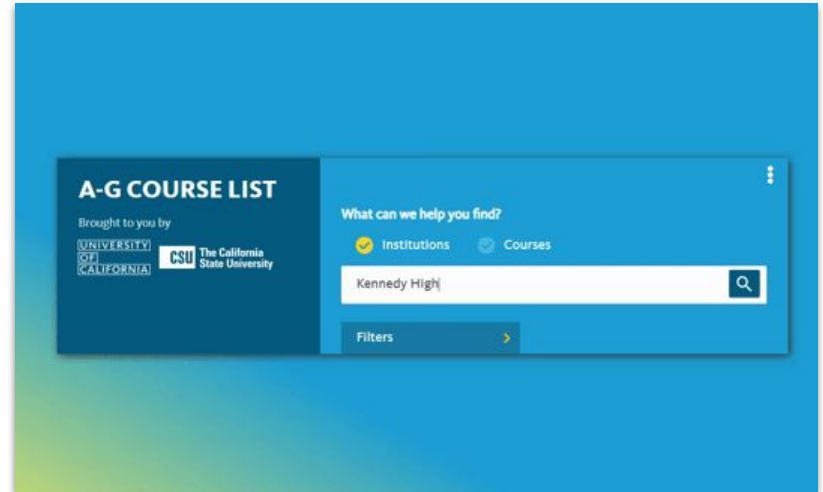




“a-g” Alignment Support

CaliforniaColleges.edu matches the course grade records provided by school districts against the Course Management Portal (CMP).

- ▶ The CMP course list is what determines which courses fulfill an “a-g” subject area.
- ▶ CaliforniaColleges.edu uses the official CMP course list for each school to **verify the transcript data** shared by districts.
- ▶ CaliforniaColleges.edu helps educators identify and resolve issues with their CMP list that may impact eligibility for students:
 - CaliforniaColleges.edu Report: Which district courses are flagged as “a-g” but do not match against the CMP?

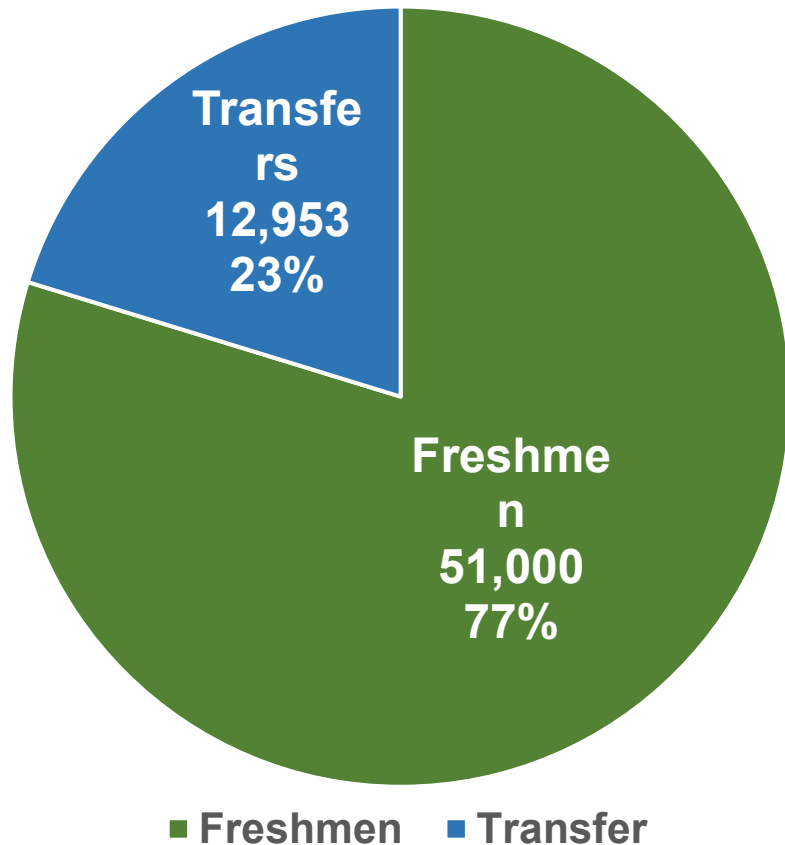
Fall 2024 Applications

- Close to **64,000** undergraduate applications for Fall 2024 were submitted to Cal Poly Pomona.
- CPP has received a **record number** of applications from First-Time Freshmen (FTF), totaling **51,000**.
 - **10% increase** from Fall 2023
 - **5th highest** of the CSU system

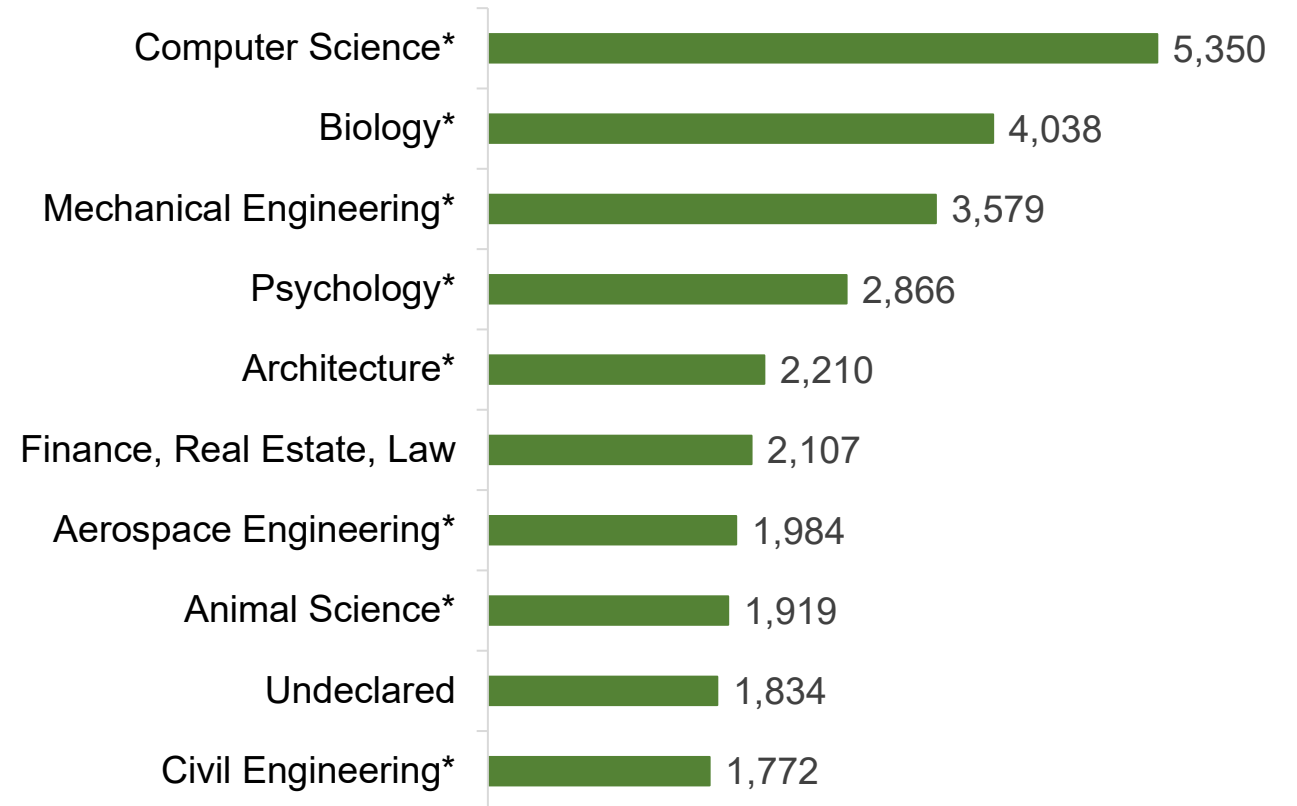


Top 10 Majors - New Freshmen in Fall 2024

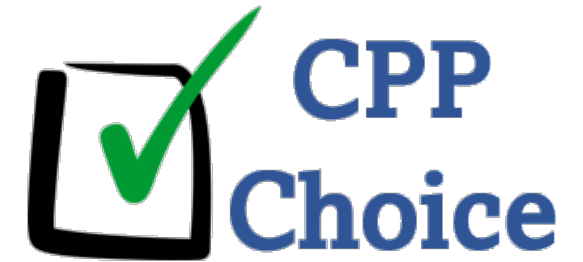

Deadlines



- In Fall 2024, CPP introduced the CPP Choice initiative targeting incoming freshmen seeking admission to high-demand impacted majors that are not admissible due to limited space within the major.
- CPP Choice allows highly qualified applicants (who would have otherwise been denied admission due to lack of space) to select a program with capacity that is closely aligned with the original major, career goals, and interests.
- These students receive an email from the dean of the college, providing details about the CPP Choice major options along with descriptions of each major and the potential career pathways.
- Freshman students who opt to change their major are automatically admitted into the new major.



A new pathway to Cal Poly Pomona

CPP Choice is an innovative program at Cal Poly Pomona designed to provide undergraduate applicants with an opportunity to explore specific majors that align with their interests and career goals. Recognizing that not every qualified applicant can be offered admission to their desired major, the program offers a curated selection of 3-5 "choice majors," identified by the college deans, that will lead to exciting career opportunities. CPP Choice allows applicants to broaden their understanding of not only what CPP has to offer, but their career aspirations.

- ✓ In the inaugural year of the CPP Choice program far exceeded our expectations.
- ✓ CPP Choice students committed to the university at a higher rate (33%) as compared to regular freshmen admits (17%). The success of this innovative program contributed to **6% of our freshmen enrollment in Fall 2023.**
- ✓ We exceeded our first-time freshman enrollment goals by 3% without over-enrolling our high-demand impacted programs for the first time.
- ✓ CPP Choice also helped our historically under-enrolled programs grow.
- ✓ Due to the first-year success of CPP Choice, Cal Poly Pomona plans to expand it to additional high-demand freshman high-demands.

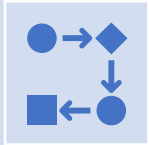

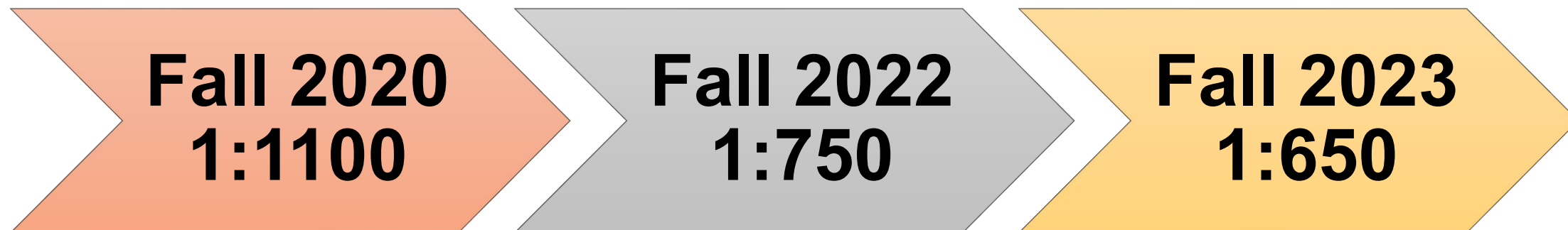




Academic Advising at CPP

- One of the most important relationships students will have will be with their academic advisor
 - Professional academic advisors in all 8 colleges and Undeclared Advising plus a central advising and enrollment services hub (BAC)
 - Advisors are experts in specific majors and partner closely with faculty mentors
- Advising Partnerships
 - Orientation: Group Advising
 - Throughout time at CPP: One-on-One and Group Advising
- Advisors will reach out to students ahead of important milestones and when students miss a milestone

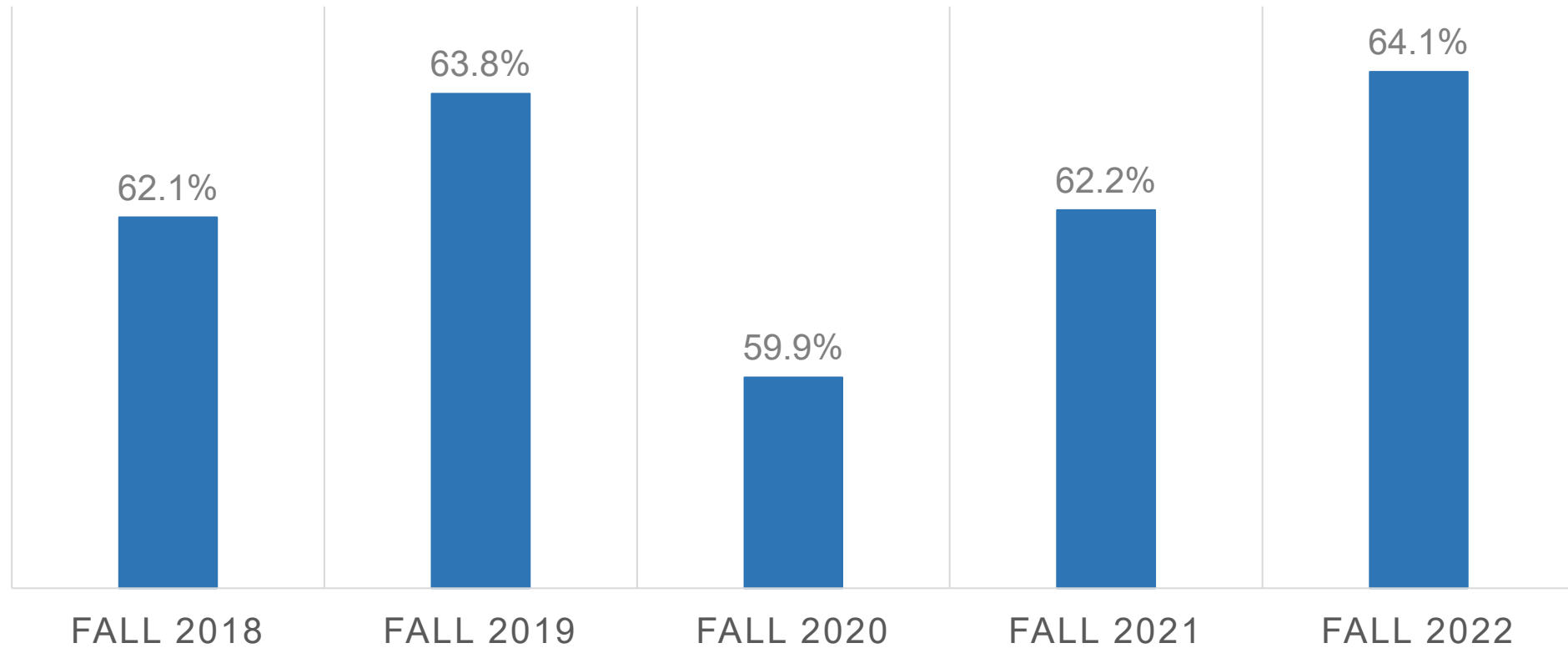

 - Students reported that they take less units to accommodate busy lives
 - Focused on overall academic year than 15-unit semesters to empower students in long-term planning and response to student needs
- Get in Gear, Take 30 a Year
 - We promote Take 30 throughout a student's academic career:
 - Orientation onboarding
 - Advising campaigns and materials
 - Summer Boost enrollment campaign

Completing 30+ Units in the First Year



Promoting Equity Through Data

- Identify 10% equity gap in college credit (CC transfer credit or AP credit)
- Demystify perceptions about students' ability and performance
- Strengthen advisor/student relationships by adapt academic plan to student needs
- Using asset-based language to encourage students and celebrate milestones

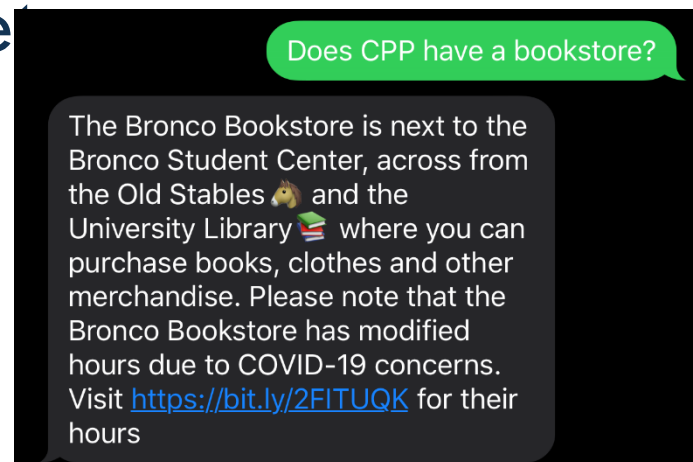

Billy Chat – an automatic (and smart) friend

- Artificial intelligence that can simulate a human conversation
- Examples: Customer Service outreach, virtual advising, etc.

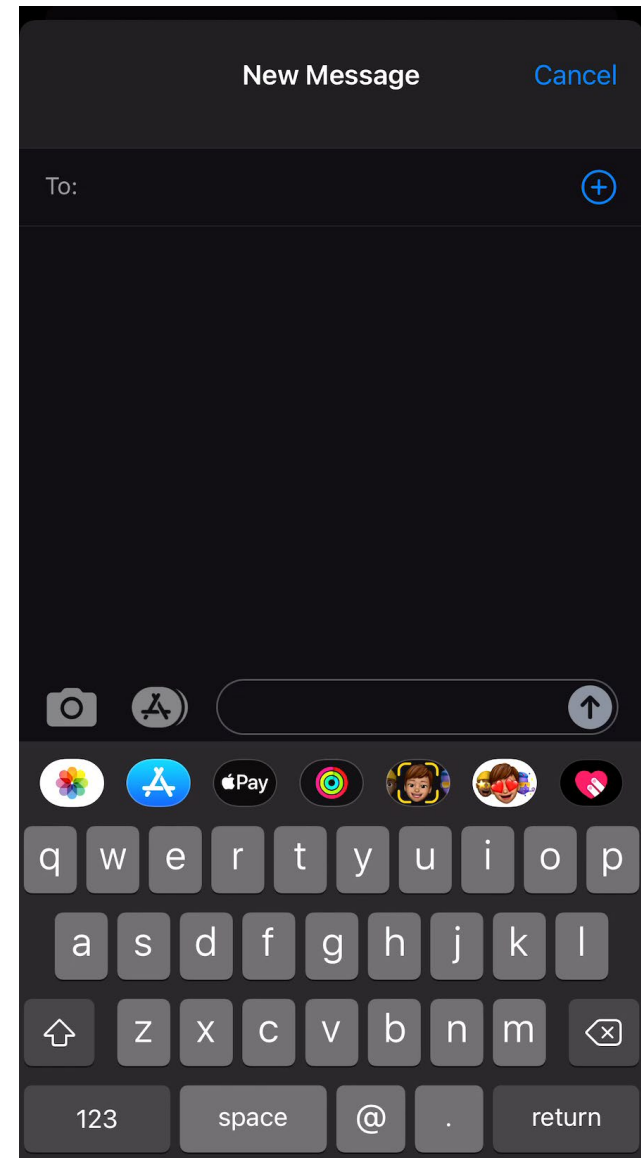

How Billy Chat works

- Students are automatically opted into receiving messages as they matriculate – they can opt out or pause at any time
- Students receive an intro email and intro text message
- It's like texting a friend – there's no additional app to download
- Students can text the bot 24/7 and get answers: if Billy doesn't know the answer or the question is sensitive, it gets escalated to a human team
- The human team has a campaign calendar of messages we send out to students
 - Nudges
 - Interactive Surveys



The Power of the Nudge

Holds Notifications

- Students get regular Billy Chat messages about Academic Standing, Financial and Title IX holds ahead of and throughout the registration cycle
- For Spring 2024 Registration:
 - 6,906 students received at least 1 text and 6,044 **holds removed (87.5 percent)**

0-Unit Outreach

- Students get Billy Chat surveys, CPP Connect enrollment campaigns, and invites to special registration events
- For Spring 2024 Registration:
 - **2,979 of 4,028** students who were eligible for a Stop-Out term enrolled in Spring 2024 (**74 percent of total eligible population**)
 - **310 of 1,176** students who were in danger of Discontinuation enrolled in Fall 2023 (26 percent of total eligible population)

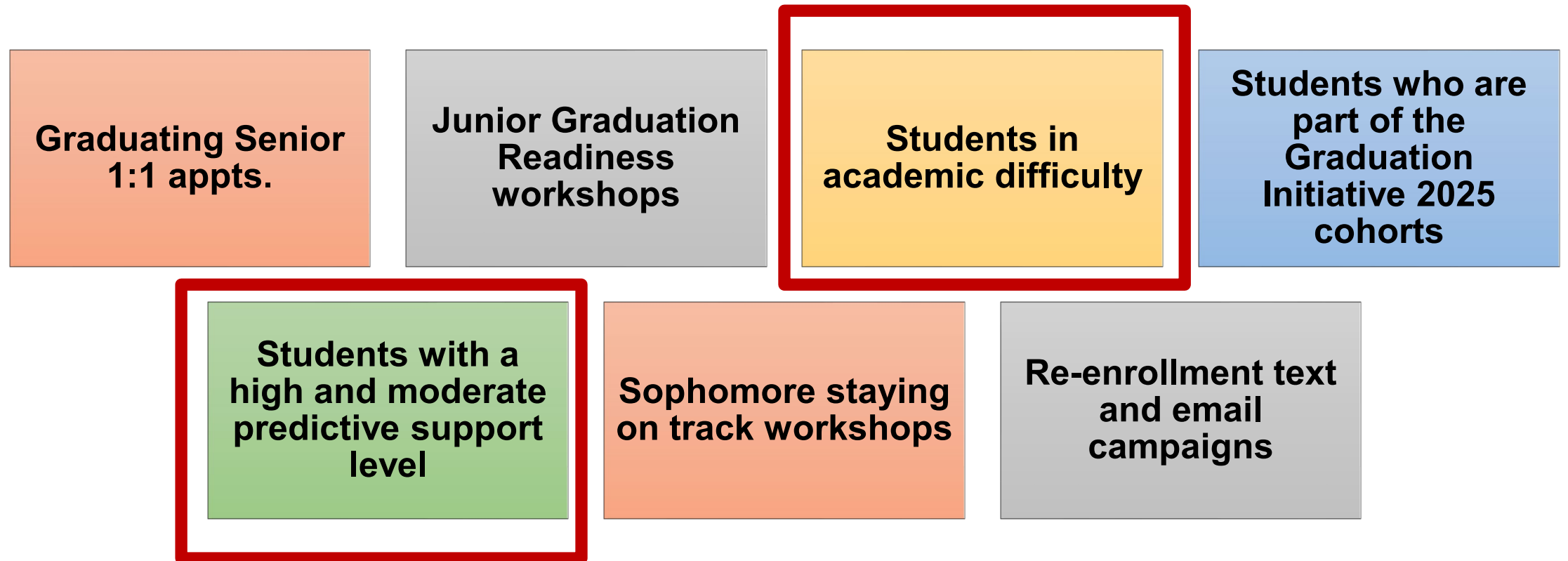

Intervention Outcomes

High Predictive Support Level

- Students who attended a meeting had higher GPAs (2.78) than students who did not (2.56)

Academic Standing Support

- Students who attended a meeting had higher re-enrollment rates (80%) than students who did not (36%)
