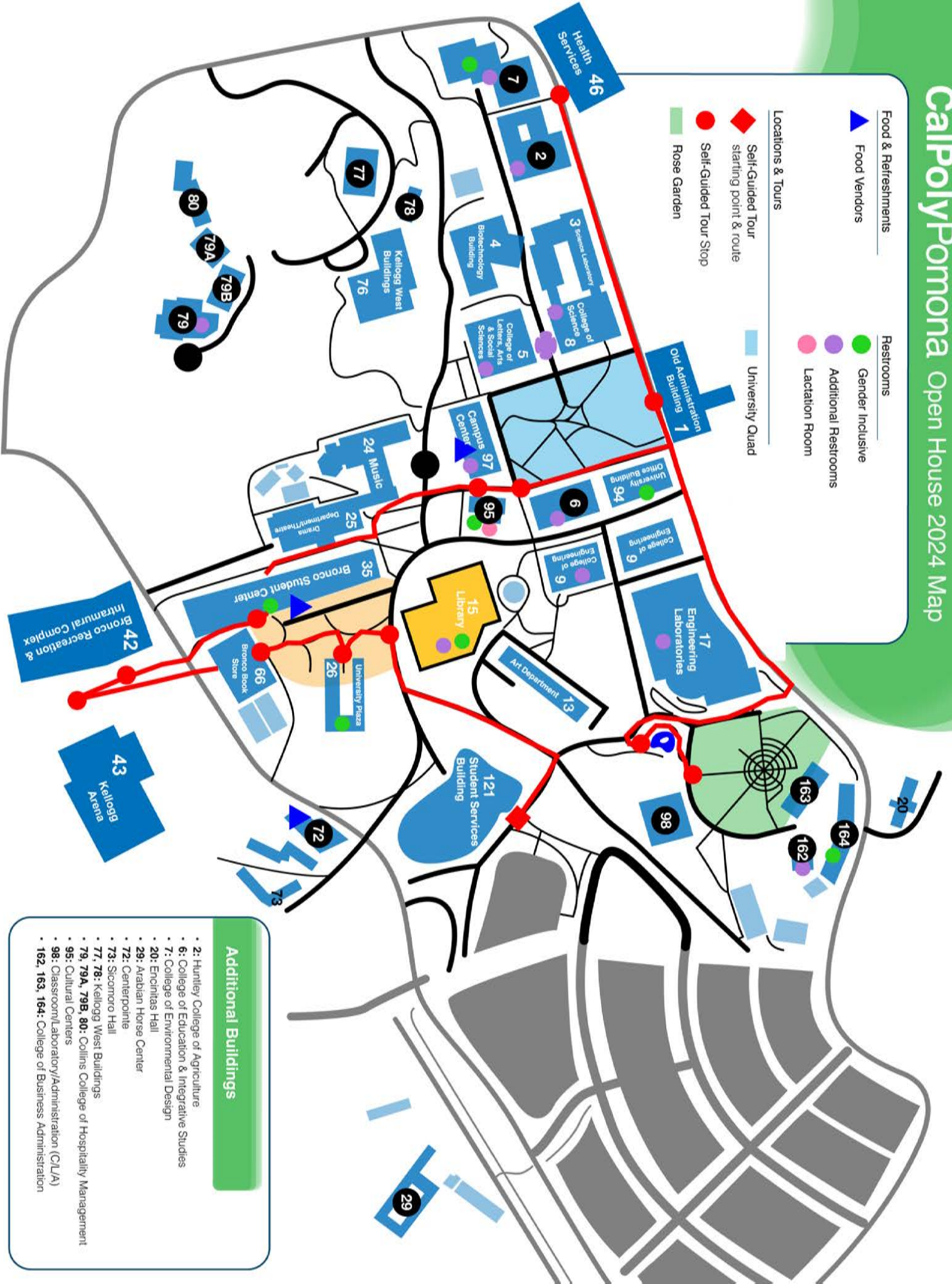

Welcome

Welcome to Cal Poly Pomona (CPP)! As the #1 Polytechnic University for Diversity and Economic Mobility and the #2 Top Public School in the West, we help anyone who dreams of success achieve it! We're excited to have you at our beautiful campus.

CPP History

Cal Poly Pomona opened on Sept. 15, 1938, with an all-male enrollment of 110 students as the Voorhis Unit of California State Polytechnic College in San Luis Obispo. It was located on the 150-acre San Dimas site of the former Voorhis School for Boys.

Breakfast cereal magnate W.K. Kellogg deeded 813 acres of land located three miles south of the Voorhis campus to the state of California in 1949.

In 1956, 508 students and 44 faculty and staff moved from San Dimas to the Kellogg campus. In a first for the all-male campus, 329 women joined the student body in 1961. The Pomona campus separated from the San Luis Obispo campus in 1966 and became California State Polytechnic College, Kellogg Campus. University status was granted in 1972.

Today, the university is part of the 23-campus California State University system. Cal Poly Pomona has about 24,000 students and 2,600 faculty and staff.

To begin your tour, you will start at the Student Services Building

1. Student Services Building (SSB)

Building 121



You will undoubtedly visit the SSB at some point in your Cal Poly Pomona experience, as it houses Campus Tours, Admissions, Bronco Advising Center, Financial Aid, PolyTransfer, and many other service departments.

2. University Library

Building 15



The University Library is a hot spot among students for studying and collaborating – including at the first floor Starbucks! If you need a computer, study space, or a way to help you save money on books, the library can help. The building is also home to:

- **The Maker Studio** – Bring the ideas in your head to life using the wide variety of tools here – from 3D laser printers to sewing supplies to electric drills.
- **The Arabian Horse Library** – Immerse yourself in the history of William K. Kellogg and his Arabian horse collection.
- **Bronco Family Space** – Bring your little one to this family-friendly space filled with interactive materials for children and caregivers, including board and picture books, age-appropriate toys, puzzles, dramatic play items, blocks, and more.
- **The Learning Resource Center** – Need academic support? You can get coaching on academic skills, tutoring, supplemental instruction, or help with your writing here.
- **Don B. Huntley Gallery** – Enjoy the collections, including projects from faculty and students from the College of Environmental Design, at this gallery that is free and open to the public.

You can now exit the library and walk across University Park toward University Plaza.

3. University Plaza



If you want to get involved on campus, the University Plaza is a great place to start! Built in 1927 for W.K. Kellogg to house his Arabian horses, many students call it “the old stables.” Today it is home to the Office of Student Engagement, Leadership and Success, which oversees 316 clubs and organizations, Greek Life and the Rose Float program. You are bound to find a group that meets your interests, or you can create your own!

Greek Life

Cal Poly Pomona’s fraternities and sororities provide you with plenty of leadership, community, and philanthropic opportunities while creating an enriching college experience.

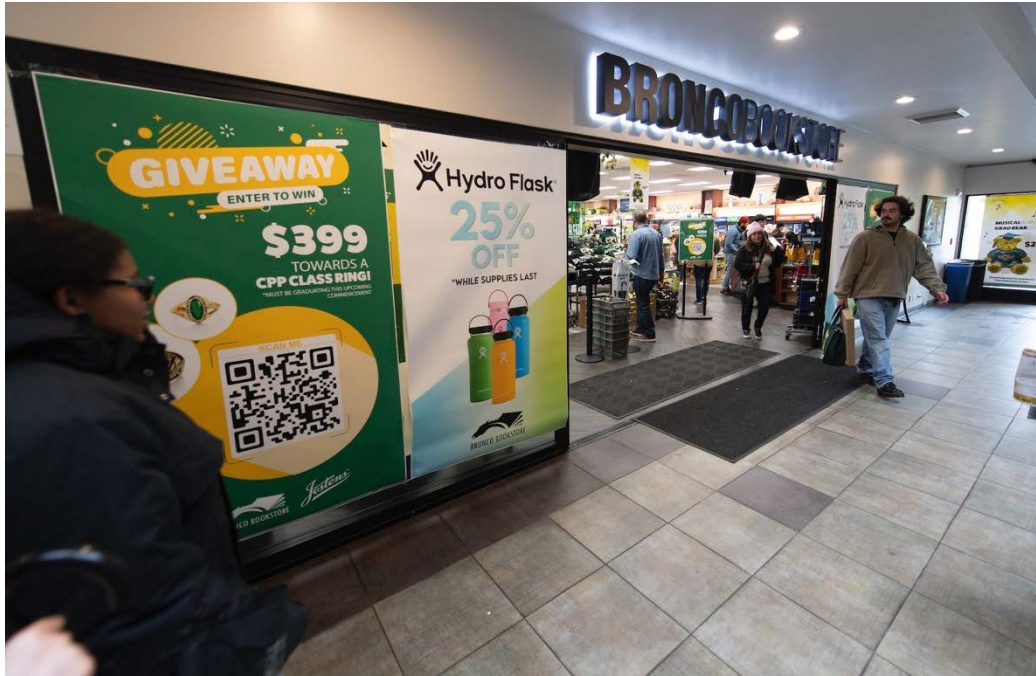
Old Stables

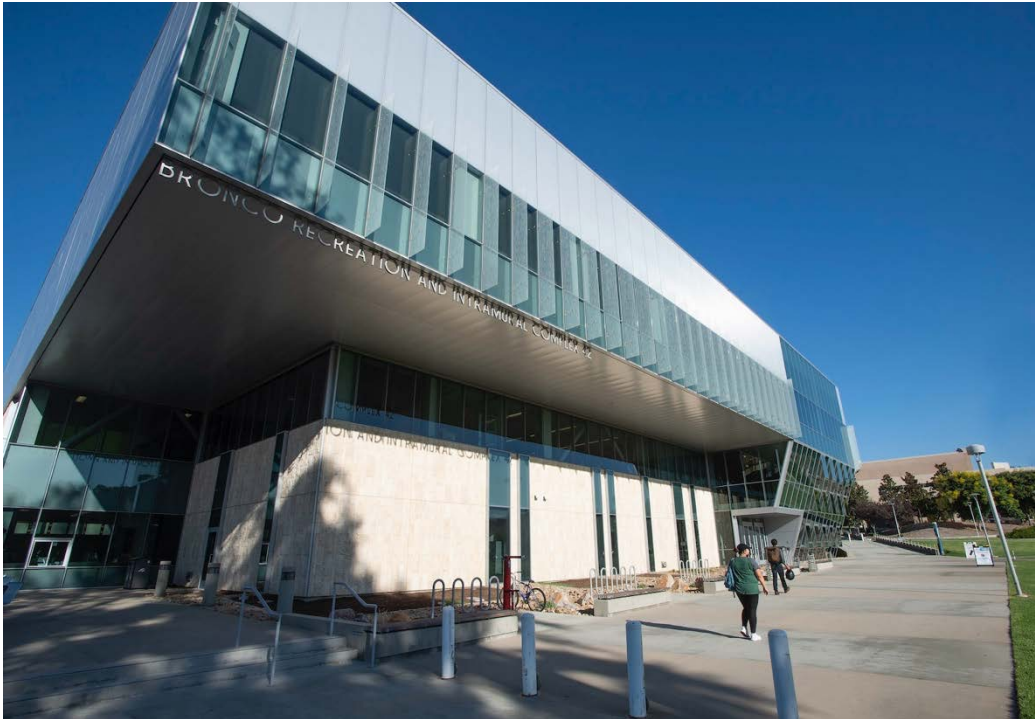
Children's Center

Located across from the Bronco Bookstore, the Children's Center offers preschool services for the children of students, faculty, staff and community parents, with priority given to student-parents.

Continue through the bookstore and enter the lower end of campus, the Bronco Commons.

5. Bronco Recreation and Intramural Complex (BRIC)

Building 42



The BRIC is the main fitness and activity center on campus and is open to all students. You can take fitness classes, play sports on our multipurpose courts, run a lap on our indoor track, pump iron with the huge selection of workout equipment or rock climb on our 51-foot rock wall — the tallest in the CSU system!

★ Intramural Sports

You can join intramural sports through the BRIC, regardless of prior experience.

★ Sports Clubs

Sports clubs are open to all students of any experience level. You can take part in everything from basketball and volleyball to lesser-known choices like kendo, rock climbing and ultimate frisbee.

You can proudly wave the CPP banner when competing against other universities in intercollegiate league tournaments! All are welcome; we have multiple division teams for different skill levels.

6. Kellogg Arena

Building 43



Come cheer on Cal Poly Pomona's basketball and volleyball teams at the Kellogg Arena. CPP students get in for free! The Broncos compete as a part of NCAA Division II in the California Collegiate Athletic Association.

In total, we have 11 team sports:

7. Bronco Student Center (BSC)

Building 35

The BSC is also home to the Bronco Copy N’ Mail Center and the Poly Pantry, which serves students experiencing food insecurity.

8. The Centers for Transformation, Retention, Equity and Empowerment (TREE)

Building 95



TREE offers community spaces to validate and elevate students' identities, lived experiences, and cultural wealth. There are six centers on campus offering programming and resources to help empower students and enhance cross-cultural communication and experiences.

★ The Asian & Pacific Islander Student Center

The Asian & Pacific Islander Student Center promotes social justice, equity and student success through education and community engagement, affirming and celebrating cultural identities within the Asian, Pacific Islander and Desi diaspora.

Black Resource Center

The Black Resource Center is committed to supporting African, African American and Black students in their journey to a degree. Here you will find academic, personal and professional resources and culturally-relevant programming.

The César E. Chávez Center for Higher Education

The César E. Chávez Center for Higher Education is committed to increasing the outreach, recruitment, retention, graduation and cultural pride of Chicanxs and Latinxs at Cal Poly Pomona. We focus on academic success, community building, career readiness, social and identity development, and cultural and artistic programming throughout the year.

Native American Student Center

The mission of the Native American Student Center is to support the academic achievement and personal success of Native American students while promoting traditional culture at Cal Poly Pomona. The center works on outreach, recruitment, retention and graduation of Native American students at CPP and serves as a resource to the campus community on Native American issues.

Pride Center

The Pride Center provides education, advocacy, support and a safe space for the lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, intersex, queer, questioning (LGBTIQQ) and ally communities at Cal Poly Pomona. We also promote empowerment and social justice on topics of sexual orientation and gender identity.

The Womxn's Resource Center (WRC)

The Womxn's Resource Center promotes gender equity through empowerment and consciousness-raising. It also supports womxn-identified individuals so they can flourish and advocate for a more equitable society. The center provides programs, workshops, referrals, group support and opportunities for personal and academic growth.

Across from TREE, you will see our Campus Marketplace building, which houses our Care Center and Career Center on the lower floor and a variety of food options on the upper floor

Building 97



9. Care Center

Buildings 8, 3 and 4

Enjoy our ethnobotany garden filled with native California plants such as aromatic sage brushes, agave plants and milkweeds that support local monarch butterflies. You'll find wild strawberry plants, acorn-bearing oak trees and an array of flowers that provide homes for hummingbirds, lizards and many insects too!

Building 46



Whether you need medical assistance or a simple check-up, a staff of licensed medical doctors, nurse practitioners and registered nurses are available to assist you at our health center. Once enrolled as a student, your prepaid health fee covers most services, including office visits for routine medical care (colds, flu, cuts, sprains, etc.), x-rays, minor surgery and most lab work. Student Health and Wellness Services is accredited by the Accreditation Association for Ambulatory Health Care, Inc.

Follow University Drive down toward our Japanese Garden and Rose Garden

15. George and Sakaye Aratani Japanese Garden



If you are looking for a tranquil spot to relax on campus, this is it! Students find the Japanese Garden to be a slice of paradise in the middle of campus. Opened in 2003, the garden features traditional Japanese flora, a large reflection pond, a cascading waterfall, overlooking bridges, and intricate walkways. It was designed by our very own landscape architecture professor, Takeo Uesugi.

16. Rose Garden



What started as a loving gesture for his wife, the W.K. Kellogg Commemorative Rose Garden is now an iconic campus landmark for all Broncos to enjoy. As part of Mr. Kellogg's wishes, at least one rose must be in bloom year-round. The very first graduation ceremony was held in the rose garden too.

17. Campus Housing

Offices – Building 74

Build lifelong connections with other Broncos and experience all student life has to offer by living on campus! You'll have easier access to academic support and recreational events without the hassles of commuting and traffic.

New Residential Halls (Secoya & Sicomoro)

Buildings 73 and 74



Sicomoro and Secoya are our newest residence halls. They are close to the Centerpointe Dining Commons, university plaza, library and Bronco Student Center, so you'll never miss what's happening on campus. Each hall offers single, double and triple rooms.

Traditional Halls

Buildings 20, 21, 22, and 23



If you want a classic residence hall experience, the traditional halls are for you! These red-brick buildings are near the colleges, library and Bronco Student Center, making it easy to get to class, study and enjoy the campus. Each traditional hall offers single, double and triple rooms.

Residential Suites

Buildings 52, 54, 60, 61, 62 and 63



The residential suites are communities for upper-division and transfer students designed with privacy, comfort and convenience in mind. Offering beautiful views of the campus and the San Gabriel Mountains, all suites have balconies, an interior entrance leading into a living room and kitchenette area and individual bedrooms.

18. Centerpointe

Building 72

19. Kellogg Arabian Horse Center

Building 29



You do not need to be a horse expert or involved in animal science to enjoy the W.K. Kellogg Arabian Horse Center! All students can visit during the week or join the Horsemanship Club. The center carries on the Arabian horse breeding legacy of W.K. Kellogg and houses over 60 purebred Arabian horses and roughly ten to 15 foals each year. See students and the horses perform monthly at our Sunday Shows that run from October to May!

20. University Police and Parking Services

Parking and Transportation Services

The Foothill Transit Silver Streak bus stops outside the Student Services Building, making it easier to get to your favorite destinations, including Downtown LA!

22. Farm Store
