

THE LEGACY OF SEES FOUNDER – DR. PAUL HIEMENZ

JUNE 23, 1936 - NOVEMBER 8, 2023



It's with tears and a lot of sadness that we learned Dr. Paul Hiemenz, creator of SEES and Emeritus Chemistry Professor, passed away. Dr. Hiemenz created the SEES program in 1987 and mentored hundreds of students who felt the direct impact of his guidance, love and dedication. His influence is felt 37 years after the program's creation as it has helped launch thousands of students into their careers and has helped students during their Cal Poly Pomona journey by offering a community, mentoring, advising, academic support, professional development, financial support, and a home. Dr. Hiemenz was awarded the Outstanding Professor Award by the University in 1970.

Dr. Hiemenz was a very- loved and dedicated professor in the College of Science for 36 years from 1965 to 1999. He was the author of two Chemistry textbooks, and a generous philanthropist to future generations attending his beloved academic institutions. He was the benefactor of the Paul C. Hiemenz Award, which continues to be awarded each year to the SEES student that best demonstrates academic

excellence, leadership and contribution to the program. He enjoyed reading, and loved traveling to all parts of the world, especially Hawaii and Mexico. He nurtured his artistic side creating pastel drawings of his favorite trip locations, attending plays especially at the Ahmanson and Pasadena Playhouse, and jazz concerts at the Hollywood bowl. Dr. Hiemenz will be missed greatly and we are indebted to him for the incredible contributions he made to the Cal Poly Pomona community.

A Pillar of Student Success

For nearly four decades, the SEES program at Cal Poly Pomona has been a driving force behind the academic and personal growth of underrepresented minority (URM) students in the sciences. This comprehensive initiative has stood the test of time, providing a multifaceted support system that has proven instrumental in fostering student success and retention.



SEES was established in fall 1987 by Dr. Paul Hiemenz to increase the retention and the number of URM students graduating from Cal Poly Pomona with degrees in the sciences and mathematics. Currently, the program serves 700+ students. The program maintains a support structure comprised of various components, each of which address a barrier to success in college.

Over the course of 37 years, the SEES program has proven its enduring value, facilitating the success and retention of URM students within the sciences by umbrella of providina a comprehensive support it continues to evolve and adapt to the services. changing needs of its students, the program remains a beacon of hope and empowerment, ensuring that the next generation of STEM leaders has the resources and guidance necessary to thrive.

At the heart of this comprehensive support system are the program's Director, Dr. Alas (2013-present), and Coordinator, Kristen Urias, who serve as pillars of support and problem advisors. Students consistently turn to them for guidance on academic, professional, family, financial, and emotional issues, finding in the SEES program a center of resolution amidst the challenges they face.

At its core, the SEES program offers a peer mentoring program and a faculty-alumni-student mentoring program, fostering a sense of community and guidance that is invaluable for navigating the rigors of STEM fields.






